Pastor's Message

Dear Friends.

United's Children's Garden is overflowing with tomatoes, beans, squash, and peppers! Come by to see the fruits of the kids' "praying in the dirt":-). Many thanks to all the volunteers who helped them plant, water, and harvest this little corner of God's creation, with a special



shout-out to Donna Clark, who oversaw it all, and Gabby Dietrich, Summer Coordinator. Each week, the abundant harvest provides fresh vegetables for the guests of the Interfaith Shelter.

Late summer is a "gathering-in" time all around Northern New Mexico. Here at United, along with harvesting squash, peppers and tomatoes, we're also gathering in ideas and experiences, as we gather in small groups to reflect on the past year and a half of "corona-time" and also look ahead to God's call for the future. This harvest of ideas has already taught us a good deal about the impact of the pandemic on our individual lives and our life as a church.

One important insight gleaned from the gatherings is that while we may have all been under the same shelter-in-place and social distance restrictions, we haven't had the same experience. For some, it's been an opportunity to reflect and go deeper in faith and life. For others, especially parents, it's been to-the-bone exhausting. For all in the workplace, the constant pivots from virtual to hybrid and back again have been confusing and demanding. For United's healthcare workers, the new surge in cases and hospitalizations is both disheartening and beyond belief, now that there's a vaccine.

Some of us in this time could reconnect more deeply with family or long-distance friends. For others, the isolation and justifiable fear of the virus has led to searing loneliness and even despair.

Another gleaning is that our spiritual experiences have varied as well. Some have wondered where is God in the midst of the pandemic, racial injustice, or the climate-related disasters of the last two years. Others have found strength and resolve in a new appreciation for "Thy will be done" and a deeper trust in God's presence. But a shared understanding is that we're not in charge ("as if we ever were," as one person said), and also that we have an even deeper responsibility to "love our neighbor."

Not surprisingly, our experiences of United have also been different. For some, the virtual worship services are a life-line. For others, they've only increased the sense of loneliness, as one person shared. "I'm not a tech person," someone offered, "and this time has been really hard." At the same time, people expressed deep appreciation for all the connections the church volunteers and staff have made in this time, from the monthly Communion deliveries to Zoom classes and choir presentations to "Drop-by Blessings" of students, teachers, pets, and even pledges.

To a person, members and friends are also grateful for United's continued care for the wider community and world. "I'm sorry not to be able to cook for the Shelters or to serve in person," one person said, "but I'm glad that from the beginning United figured out a way to keep caring for our neighbors near and far."

Just as the Children's Garden has yielded an abundant harvest, so have these gatherings offered an abundance of insights, connections, and hope as we look to the future. Thanks be to God, they've fed our souls, that we might feed the souls and bodies of others. Stay tuned for the next round!

Worship in September

"In Such a Time"

The scripture lessons for September jump all around the Bible, from the Gospel of Mark back to the Psalms, then back to the Book of Esther and then leapfrogging to the Christian Letter of James. But throughout these disparate texts runs the theme of God's presence "in such a time" and our call to trust God and love neighbor in all times.

Jesus Needs a Time-Out Labor Day Sunday September 5

In the 7th chapter of Mark's Gospel, a foreign woman with a gravely ill daughter finds Jesus when he's trying to get some downtime. He snarls at her, but she persists and he heals her daughter. The woman is to be commended for her advocacy on behalf of her daughter, but this Sunday, let's focus on Jesus. If even he needed a break—aka Sabbath rest—then perhaps it is okay for us to acknowledge that need, too. Recognizing the basic needs of workers was the motivation for the first Labor Day. Whatever our work, it's still a need.



Songs from All Times, for All Time Fiesta Sunday September 12

"The heavens are telling the glory of God," sings Psalm 19. "Their voice goes out through all the earth!" This Sunday will be a "Fiesta of Song," as we share God's music from around the world and across the ages. We'll also share Communion—both virtually with the recorded one and in-person in the outdoor service.

For Such a Time as This September 19

What are we willing to risk for the sake of others? For the sake of the truth? Queen Esther faced those questions when her people, the Jews, faced annihilation at the hand of her husband the king. He had already banished his first wife for disobeying him. What would Esther do "in such a time as this?" What are we willing to do in our time, for the sake of the truth and the sake of others?

Not on Our Timeline September 26

Whoever wrote the "Letter of James" had to be a patient person. He had no first-hand experience of Jesus or the Resurrection. He was writing to third-generation Christians who had grown impatient when the Second Coming didn't come. His job wasn't simply to help them keep the faith, but to **be faithful**. Faithful to the call to love God and love neighbor (even the ones they didn't like). Faithful to the church community (even when it didn't meet their expectations or fill their wants). Faithful to Jesus' ways of justice and compassion. No wonder "James" wrote about the farmer who waits for the early and late rain, steadfastly trusting in the God of earth and sky. May we have such patience and trust, too.

Updated Pandemic Protocols – adopted by the Church Council

Our faith calls us to love our neighbor. In this time of global pandemic, we show that love for neighbor through following health and safety protocols and encouraging others to do the same.

- The United Church <u>expects</u> all members and friends to be vaccinated, unless a person's medical condition and/or age precludes vaccination.
- Because scientists are still learning how much of a viral load a vaccinated person can carry and because the United Church community includes children who are too young to be vaccinated and adults who cannot be vaccinated due to medical conditions, masks and social distancing are required for all indoor gatherings (which are limited to 20 people) and for outdoor worship (at this time). Director of Choirs Bradley Ellingboe will send information regarding the rehearsals soon. To maintain social distancing, we'll still need to limit the number of singers each Sunday, but the good news is that the choir will be singing more frequently!

On Sunday, Sept. 26, we welcome a guest pianist when I am away.

I've also sung with Coro Melodia in Mexico City and the Sri Lanka Symphony Chorus in Colombo, Sri Lanka."


